# Why Study? A Taste of Torah



It was reported about Hillel the Elder that every day he used to work and earn one tropaik, half of which he would give to the guard at the House of Learning, the other half being spent for his food and for that of his family. One day, he found nothing to earn and the guard at the House of Learning would not permit him to enter. He climbed up and sat upon the window, to hear the words of the living God from the mouth of Shemayah and Abtalion – They say that day was the eve of Sabbath in the winter solstice and snow fell down upon him from heaven.

When the dawn rose, Shemayah said to Abtalion: Brother Abtalion, on every day, this house is light and to-day it is dark; is it perhaps a cloudy day? They looked up and saw the figure of a man in the window. They went up and found him covered by three cubits of snow. They removed him, bathed and anointed him, and placed him opposite the fire and they said: This man deserves that the Sabbath be profaned on his behalf (Talmud, Yoma 35b).

Once upon a time, the study of Torah was exclusively open to the most fortunate – the sons of the rich, or others who could afford to dedicate their lives to learning. Luckily, things have changed. We all can opt to study Torah. The scriptures are open to all.

We are standing at the beginning of another year, and here at The Temple, we offer you the opportunity to study Torah, whenever you wish: during most of the weekdays, mornings or evenings.

Why study Torah?

One reason for which I love the study of Torah is the kaleidoscopic aspect of these texts – the same materials and forms change continuously, in front of our eyes. The Biblical story is an ongoing revolution, which nonetheless ties directly to its own creation.

We can always weigh and review what we have only recently learned, and ask: “maybe this is not true? Maybe it is possible to understand the text, or the commandment and its context completely differently.” Indeed, maybe all that we learned last year is totally the opposite of what we will try to learn today, and the same will happen tomorrow.

On this, we should listen to our Sage Ben Bag Bag:

**BEN BAG BAG SAID: TURN THE TORAH OVER, AND [AGAIN] TURN IT OVER, FOR ALL IS IN THE TORAH ... FOR YOU HAVE NO BETTER STANDARD OF CONDUCT (Ethics of our fathers, Chapter 5:22).**

Studying Torah becomes meaningful when I am willing to hear the calling of the scriptures. When I let this calling enrich my life and my way of thinking, my study goes far beyond learning how I am to live my life.

The role of the Bible is to make me think – to make me look at its calling and see how it is relevant to my life today. Join us all, who study at The Temple. Check the calendar..... Hope to see you soon.

## President's Message



I want to let the congregation know about a very important undertaking The Temple is launching. This is the Foundation for our Future and the related Temple beautification project. The idea is to meet two critical needs with a single campaign.

First, the Foundation for our Future. Every year we struggle to present the congregation with an annual budget that supports the many important activities of the Temple while keeping the annual commitment level reasonable. As many of you know (especially those with school age children, particularly ones preparing for their bar or bat mitzvah), it requires a not insignificant amount of financial support to continue running The Temple. Even though we get revenue from a variety of sources, we always seem to be scrambling to fund all of our activities.

One reason this is so is that we have a relatively small endowment fund for a congregation as old as ours. Many nonprofit organizations generate income from endowment assets that go to support operations and take some of the burden off of other funding sources. Our goal is to increase our endowment funds through our Foundation for our Future so that in the future we can use income from it to lessen the need for income from other sources.

Our strategy for raising endowment funds is to couple this with an extensive outdoor Temple beautification program. We have had a landscape architectural firm come up with many ideas that, if implemented, would dramatically enhance the look, feel, and functionality of our grounds. Some of the ideas require major contributions and would be tied to naming opportunities for the particular project being funded. Others are as simple as buying a brick to honor someone and have these bricks form various walkways around the campus.

We tie these two needs together by requiring a contribution that is at least double the cost of a particular beautification project. The excess contribution would go into the Foundation for the Future. So, The Temple wins twice. We upgrade the appearance and functionality of our grounds and begin the process of raising significant endowment funds.

Over the next several months, everybody will have a chance to see the various projects and how much of a financial commitment they will require. I urge every one to give thoughtful consideration to how they might participate.

This marks the tenth year that the Jewish Community has been helping make homes a reality for Louisville families through the Louisville Habitat for Humanity Program. October 7, 8, and 9 mark this year's "Raise the Roof" event on the ICE House: Interfaith Community Effort (a partnership with Episcopalians, Presbyterians and Jewish volunteers) at 2925 Dumesnil Street for Gina Crutcher and her son.

# Making a Case for Building our Temple Endowment



In these tough economic times, why would we embark on The Temple's Endowment Campaign? The answer is fairly simple. The Temple has been faced with incredible financial decisions during these recent economic downturns and it is evident that our current endowment funds are not sufficient to support the needs of our congregation in times of greater need. Our goal is to build an Endowment Fund to generate sufficient interest to support the yearly budget without relying solely on increases to members' financial commitment.

For a congregation with our 165 year history, our endowment – those funds that are held in a separate account with the purpose of generating interest – was less than a three-quarters of a million dollars. Our goal is to grow the Endowment Fund using a multi-tier approach that will offer opportunities for every member of our congregation to participate.

The Temple Board has approved posting a \$4.00 per month per family Endowment contribution to members' monthly statements, beginning this month. Members will have several options: a) pay the minimum \$4.00 per month donation; b) pay a single \$48.00 donation in advance; or c)

offer to pay more than the minimum donation. The donations received will be transferred directly to The Temple's Endowment Fund. This plan revives the endowment campaign that was instituted in the 1980s. With this initiative, ALL Temple members will be participants in building our Temple's Foundation for our Future.

The Landscape Project is another vehicle for building our Endowment's Foundation for our Future. Families may honor special life cycle occasions such as naming babies, Bar and Bat Mitzvahs, Confirmations, marriages and similar special events by donating bricks to the walking path, trees to be planted in the Mitzvah garden, or by contributing in similar ways to the beautification of our campus. These projects will begin once the Landscape and Endowment funds have been raised.

Several Temple members have recalled a quote from Dr. Herbert Waller: "If people gave what THEY thought they should, we could build a very nice Sukkah. If people gave what other people thought they should, we would have a splendid Temple!" Please donate generously to help us build a splendid future for our Temple.

## Why I Love My Temple

As you consider why you LOVE our Temple, please consider how you can be a part of building the future of the congregation. Soon, a \$4.00 per month contribution to the Endowment Fund will be added to members' monthly statements. For a moment, consider the numbers. What would a \$4.00 contribution to support the Temple Endowment mean? Would it be possible once a month to give up?

- that Egg McMuffin and beverage at McDonalds one morning a month (Cost about \$4.00)?
- a Bloomin' Onion from Outback (Cost \$6.25); or a large Papa Johns Pizza with beverage (Cost \$12.99);
- a copy of your favorite magazine (Cost \$5.00)?

Donations received will be transferred directly to The Temple's Endowment Fund. The Endowment Fund will grow and over time the interest generated from the Endowment Fund will be used to supplement the yearly Temple budget. As you consider the many reasons that you love YOUR Temple community, please participate as we build the endowment to meet the needs of our Temple community for this generation and for the generations to come.

Ask yourself a simple question: Why should I support The Temple Endowment/Landscape Plan? If you ask that question to ten different people, you will probably get ten different answers. They would all be correct. There are no wrong answers as long as you support the project(s) of your choice.

As chairman of the Building and Grounds (House) Committee I can answer the question several different ways, as a congregant, as a Board member and as a committee member.

- The Landscape Plan will be something my children and future grandchildren can enjoy for years to come
- The Plan will always be changing. As we complete one section of the Landscape Plan we will move to another. Each section

In order to explain what Charitable Remainder Trusts are and how The Temple and the donor can benefit from their use, the following is a conversation between me and fictitious Temple members Steve and Gail Wise.

Phil: Hello Steve and Gail. Thanks for inviting me over to talk about The Temple's new initiatives to grow its Endowment Fund. As an active member of The Temple for many years, this is the first time that the leadership of The Temple has made the Endowment Fund a priority.

Steve: I've been active in The Temple for 25 years myself, and I didn't know that The Temple even had an Endowment Fund. Why is enlarging the Endowment fund we had suddenly a priority?

Phil: Good question Steve. Probably the reason you didn't know The Temple had an Endowment fund is that it's not large, and the reason it's not large is that growing it has never been a priority. I'm told that Rabbi Martin Perley left most of his estate to the Temple's Endowment fund. While The Temple has the largest membership and by far the largest physical plant in Louisville's Jewish community, we don't have the largest Endowment Fund. As a matter of fact, our Endowment Fund is not even a close second.

Gail: OK Phil. So The Temple doesn't have much of an Endowment. Is that any reason to try and enlarge it now when the economy is in terrible shape?

Phil: Gail, Is there ever a "right time" for fundraising? If we wait for the "right time" to.....

Gail: I see your point.

Phil: The Temple is providing several ways for members to foster the development of its Endowment Fund. I'm here to give you information on one way, Charitable Remainder Trusts or CRTs for short.

Steve: Couldn't we just leave money to The Temple or to the Temple's Endowment Fund in our

wills? Wouldn't The Temple benefit just as much and wouldn't it be a lot less complicated than a Charitable Remainder Trust?

Phil: Two very good questions Steve and the answer is yes to both of them. The Temple benefits equally whether you make a specific bequest in your will or establish a Charitable Remainder Trust now. However, there are advantages to you in establishing a CRT that you won't get by making a specific bequest in your will. You both will receive stable income from the Trust for life.

Another benefit is that you will get a tax credit in the year you fund the CRT. You get a deduction for a portion of the amount you donated, even though The Temple will not get the assets until you pass away. You can fund the CRT with assets that you bought years ago that doubled, tripled or whatever. You will have the satisfaction of knowing that you have done something that will benefit The Temple for years to come.

Don't forget, over the past 165 years, members of our congregation have given their time and money for the building and all the furnishings that we enjoy today. We have the responsibility to do the same for the next generations. Remember, our prayer book says, "L'Dor V'Dor", from generation to generation. Without that, Judaism would have vanished long ago.

Phil: To begin the process of creating a CRT speak with your attorney, the one who wrote your will, and get his or her advice. If you have a financial advisor, you might want to talk to that person. And if you think of any questions, you can call me or Sally Younger, The Temple Administrator. If we don't have the answer to your question, we'll get it.

Imagine our Temple as a place:

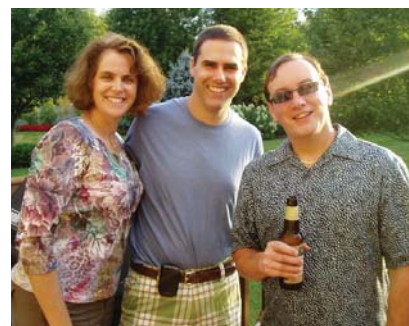

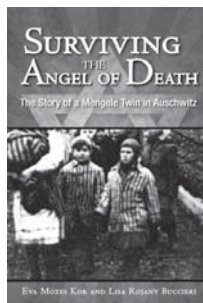

## AN INTERNATIONAL SCHOLAR OF JEWISH-CHRISTIAN RELATIONS

Amy-Jill Levine is E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Professor of New Testament Studies at Vanderbilt University. Dr. Levine's appearance in Louisville is funded by the Ginger & Martin Lewis Lecture Series at The Temple and a consortium of congregations including Second Presbyterian Church, Highland Baptist Church, St. Matthew's Episcopal, St. Paul's Episcopal in New Albany, and Interfaith Paths to Peace. Professor Levine is an engaging speaker who combines historical-critical rigor, literary-critical sensitivity, and a frequent dash of humor with a commitment to eliminating anti-Jewish, sexist, and homophobic theologies.
